The Constitution of Kenya (Amendment) Bill 2019 (National Assembly Bill No.53) on amendment of Article 97 of the Constitution underwent First Reading on 7th August, 2019. Thereafter, the Bill was committed to the Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs to review and report to the House pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 216(5) (c).

During its Sitting held on 4th July, 2019, the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs resolved to undertake public hearings on the Bill. Subsequently, the Committee through local daily newspapers of Monday 26th August and Monday 14th October, 2019 invited members of the public and organizations to attend public hearings and submit their views or make oral presentations regarding the Bill.

The Public hearings took place in the counties of Nairobi, Machakos, Mombasa, Kisumu, Kakamega, Eldoret, Nakuru, Nyeri, Meru, Turkana and Wajir during which members of the public either individually or representing institutions and organizations made presentations and submitted memoranda which the committee took into account while considering the Bill.

May I take this opportunity to express gratitude to committee members for their resilience and devotion to duty which made the consideration of the Bill successful. May I also appreciate the Speaker and Clerk of National Assembly for always providing guidance and direction to Committees in the discharge of their mandate. Finally, I commend the secretariat for exemplary performance in providing technical and logistical support to the Committee.

CHAPTER 1

1.0 PREFACE

1.1 Establishment and Mandate of the Committee

1. The Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs derives its mandate from Standing Order No. 216(5) which provides for the functions of Departmental Committees as follows-
 - (a) Investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned ministries and departments;
 - (b) Study the programme and policy objectives of ministries and departments and the effectiveness of their implementation;

 - (g) Examine treaties, agreements and conventions;
 - (h) Make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;
 - (i) Consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House pursuant to provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and
 - (j) Examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate.
2. The Second Schedule of the Standing Orders on Departmental Committees further outlines the Subjects of the Committee, as follows-
 - a. Constitutional affairs;
 - b. The administration of law and Justice
 - c. The Judiciary;
 - d. Public prosecutions;

- c. Elections;
- f. Ethics, integrity and anti-corruption; and
- g. Human rights.

CHAPTER 2

2.0 BACKGROUND

**2.1 OVERVIEW OF THE CONSTITUTION OF KENYA AMENDMENT BILL,
2019 (BILL NO.53)**

2.2 Memorandum of objects and reasons

6. The principal object of the Bill is to amend the Constitution in order to ensure that the numbers of Members of Parliament reflect the requirement of Article 27 (8) that not more than two-thirds of the members of elective or appointive bodies shall be of the same gender. The Bill further seeks to ensure that the membership of Parliament also reflects the requirement of Article 54 (2) of the Constitution that at least five percent of the members of the public in elective and appointive bodies be persons with disabilities.
7. With regard to the Membership of the County Assemblies, the Bill seeks to limit the number of representative wards to one thousand four hundred and fifty and provide for the election of one woman for at least every two wards in a County for purposes of gender parity and to remove the provision for post-election gender top-up seats.
8. The Constitution sets out equality and freedom from discrimination as fundamental rights and freedoms. The proposed amendment seeks to entrench gender equality and the inclusion of historically marginalized persons in the representation of the people by reserving a minimum number of seats in Parliament for women and persons with disability.
9. The Bill shall require a referendum in terms of Article 255 of the Constitution
10. Clause 2 of the Bill proposes to amend Article 90 to remove the reference to the election under Article 98 (1) (a) and 177 (1) (b) which it is proposed to change from nomination to election.
11. Clause 4 of the Bill proposes to amend Article 97 to increase the number of elected women members of the National Assembly from forty-seven to one hundred and thirty six. It further seeks to increase the number of persons to be nominated to the National Assembly from twelve to twenty two and limit the nomination seats to persons with disability. The proposal contains a sunset clause of ten years with a window of extension for a further ten years through an Act of Parliament.
12. Clause 5 of the Bill proposes to amend Article 98 to provide for the election of two members of the Senate of each gender by the electorate in the counties. The

clause also proposes the nomination of four persons with disability and two youth to the Senate.

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13. Clause 6 of the Bill proposes to amend Article 177 to provide for the election of a woman member of County Assembly for at least every two wards within each county for the purpose of gender parity and removes the provision on post-election gender top-up seats.
14. Clause 7 of the Bill provides for the transition into the proposed membership of Parliament and County Assemblies by saving the unexpired term of Parliament and County Assemblies from application of the proposed amendments.
15. The Bill does not delegate legislative powers nor does it limit any fundamental rights and freedoms.
16. The Bill is a Bill concerning County Governments in terms of Article 110 (1) of the Constitution as it contains provisions affecting the functions, powers and finances of County Governments and relates to the approval to the election of members of a County Assembly.
17. The Bill shall require the approval of both Houses and shall occasion additional expenditure of public fund.

Article 89 of the Constitution that is proposed to be amended;

On delimitation of electoral units;

1. *There shall be two hundred and ninety constituencies for the purposes of the election of the members of the National Assembly provided for in Article 97 (1) (a).*
2. *The Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall review the names and boundaries of constituencies at intervals of not less than eight years, and not more than twelve years, but any review shall be completed at least twelve months before a general election of members of Parliament.*
The Commission shall review the number, names and boundaries of wards periodically.
3. *If a general election is to be held within twelve months after the completion of a review by the Commission, the new boundaries shall not take effect for purposes of that election.*
4. *The boundaries of each constituency shall be such that the number of inhabitants in the constituency is, as nearly as possible, equal to the population quota, but the number of inhabitants of a constituency may be greater or lesser than the population quota in the manner specified in clause (6) to take account of—*
 - (a) Geographical features and urban centres;*
 - (b) Community of interest, historical, economic and cultural ties; and*
 - (c) Means of communication.*

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5. *The number of inhabitants of a constituency or ward may be greater or lesser than the population quota by a margin of not more than—*
 - (a) *forty per cent for cities and sparsely populated areas; and*
 - (b) *thirty per cent for the other areas.*
6. *In reviewing constituency and ward boundaries the Commission shall—*
 - (a) *Consult all interested parties; and*
 - (b) *Progressively work towards ensuring that the number of inhabitants in each constituency and ward is, as nearly as possible, equal to the population quota.*
7. *If necessary, the Commission shall alter the names and boundaries of constituencies, and the number, names and boundaries of wards.*
8. *Subject to clauses (1), (2), (3) and (4), the names and details of the boundaries of constituencies and wards determined by the Commission shall be published in the Gazette, and shall come into effect on the dissolution of Parliament first following their publication.*
9. *A person may apply to the High Court for review of a decision of the Commission made under this Article.*
10. *An application for the review of a decision made under this Article shall be filed within thirty days of the publication of the decision in the Gazette and shall be heard and determined within three months of the date on which it is filed.*
11. *For the purposes of this Article, —population quota means the number obtained by dividing the number of inhabitants of Kenya by the number of constituencies or wards, as applicable, into which Kenya is divided under this Article.*

Allocation of party list seats under Article 90 (1) provides that:

“Elections for the seats in Parliament provided for under Articles 97(1) (c) and 98 (1) (b), (c) and (d), and for the members of county assemblies under 177 (1) (b) and (c), shall be on the basis of proportional representation by use of party lists”.

Membership of the National Assembly is provided for under Article 97 as follows:

(1) The National Assembly consists of—

- (a) *two hundred and ninety members, each elected by the registered voters of single member constituencies;*
- (b) *forty-seven women, each elected by the registered voters of the counties, each county constituting a single member constituency;*

- (c) twelve members nominated by parliamentary political parties according to their proportion of members of the National Assembly in accordance with Article 96, to represent the youth, persons with disabilities and workers; and
- (d) The Speaker, who is an ex officio member.
- (2) Nothing in this Article shall be construed as excluding any person from contesting an election under clause (1) (a).

Membership of the Senate is provided for under Article 98 as follows;

- (1) The Senate consists of—
- (a) forty-seven members each elected by the registered voters of the counties, each county constituting a single member constituency;
 - (b) sixteen women members who shall be nominated by political parties according to their proportion of members of the Senate elected under clause (a) in accordance with Article 90;
 - (c) Two members, being one man and one woman, representing the youth;
 - (d) Two members, being one man and one woman, representing persons with disabilities; and
 - (e) The Speaker, who shall be an ex officio member.
- (2) The members referred to in clause (1) (c) and (d) shall be elected in accordance with Article 90.
- (3) Nothing in this Article shall be construed as excluding any person from contesting an election under clause (1) (a).

Membership of county assembly is provided for under Article 177 as follows;

- (1) A county assembly consists of—
- (a) members elected by the registered voters of the wards, each ward constituting a single member constituency, on the same day as a general election of Members of Parliament, being the second Tuesday in August, in every fifth year;
 - (b) The number of special seat members necessary to ensure that no more than two-thirds of the membership of the assembly is of the same gender;
 - (c) the number of members of marginalized groups, including persons with disabilities and the youth, prescribed by an Act of Parliament; and
 - (d) the Speaker, who is an ex officio member.
- (2) The members contemplated in clause (1) (b) and (c) shall, in each case, be nominated by political parties in proportion to the seats received in that election in that county by each political party under paragraph (a) in accordance with Article 96.

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(3) The filling of special seats under clause (1) (b) shall be determined after declaration of elected members from each ward.

(4) A county assembly is elected for a term of five years.

3.0 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN THE REVIEW OF THE BILL

18. The Committee undertook public participation on the Bill in compliance with the provision of Article 118 (1) (b) of the Constitution as read together with Standing Order 127 (3). Adverts inviting the public to make any submission regarding the proposed amendment were put in local daily newspapers of Monday 26th August and Monday 14th October, 2019 as attached to the report as **Annexure 3**.
19. In addition the Committee resolved to undertake public hearings for the bill in a number of counties where members of the public either individually or representing institutions and organizations made presentations and submitted memoranda which the Committee took into account while considering the Bill.
20. The Committee conducted public hearings in the following counties;
 - (i) Nairobi County to seek views from the capital city and its environs;
 - (ii) Machakos County to seek views from the lower Eastern region and environs;
 - (iii) Mombasa County to seek views from the Coastal region;
 - (iv) Kisumu County to seek views from the Nyanza region;
 - (v) Kakamega County to seek views from the Western region;
 - (vi) Meru County to seek views from the Eastern region;
 - (vii) Uasin Gishu County to seek views from the Central Rift Valley region;

 - (x) Turkana County to seek views from the Rift Valley

27. In compiling this report, the committee considered submissions by members of the public on the subject matter.
28. Several members of the public either individually or representing institutions and organizations submitted their views to the Committee by way of written and oral submissions.
29. A comprehensive list of members of the public who attended the public hearings in various counties is attached to this report as **annexure 4**.
30. The matrixes noting the general comments in support or against the amendments are attached to the report as **annexure 5**.
31. The matrix also documents various proposed amendments to the Bills by members of the public and institutions.

3.1 Institutions

3.2 United Disabled Persons of Kenya

32. Following adverts in the newspapers, United Disabled Persons of Kenya sent a memorandum on 9th August, 2019 attached to the report as **annexure 6** and submitted that;
 - (i) Caucus on Disability Rights Advocacy and United Disabled Persons of Kenya agreed with the proposals in the Constitution of Kenya (Amendment) Bill, 2019 (Bill), seeking to ensure that the membership of Parliament reflects Article 54 (2) of the Constitution which requires that at least five per cent of the members of elective or appointive bodies should be persons with disabilities.
 - (ii) The proposals in the Constitution of Kenya (Amendment) Bill, 2019 (Bill), seeking to ensure that the membership of Parliament reflects Article 54 (2) of the Constitution which requires that at least five per cent of the members of elective or appointive bodies should be persons with disabilities.
 - (iii) Caucus on Disability Rights Advocacy and United Disabled Persons of Kenya agreed with Clause 4 of the Bill which proposes to replace Article 97 (1) (c) of the Constitution, to specify that the membership of the National Assembly shall include twenty-two persons with disabilities nominated by parliamentary political parties according to their proportion in the

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National Assembly in accordance with Article 90. They also agreed, as proposed in the Bill, that the slate of nominees with disabilities should take into account the two-thirds gender rule established in Article 27 (8) of the Constitution.

- (iv) Caucus on Disability Rights Advocacy and United Disabled Persons of Kenya supported the provision in Clause 5 of the Bill which specifies that the Senate shall include four senators with disabilities nominated by political parties according to their proportion of membership in the Senate elected under clause (1) (a) in accordance with Article 90 of the Constitution.
- (v) Clause 6 of the Bill does not make any material changes on the election of persons with disabilities to County Assemblies in terms of Article 177 of the Constitution.
- (vi) The Caucus recommended insertion of three provisions in Articles 97, 98 and 177 of the Constitution, to apply to legislators with disabilities nominated to the National Assembly, the Senate and County Assemblies respectively as follows;

33. In Clause 4 of the Bill, the following new clause should be inserted in Article 97 of the Constitution:

"Prior to preparing its list of persons with disabilities for nomination to the National Assembly, each political party shall consult nationally representative organizations of persons with disabilities to determine candidates suitable for nomination, subject to regulations which the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall prepare."

In Clause 5 of the Bill, the following new clause should be inserted in Article 98 of the Constitution:

"Prior to preparing its list of persons with disabilities for nomination to the Senate, each political party shall consult nationally representative organizations of persons with disabilities to determine candidates suitable for nomination, subject to regulations which the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall prepare."

34. In Clause 6 of the Bill, the following new clause should be inserted in Article 177 of the Constitution:

'Prior to preparing its list of persons with disabilities for nomination to a County Assembly, each political party shall consult organizations of persons with disabilities representative in the particular county to determine candidates suitable for nomination, subject to regulations which the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall prepare.'

3.3 Individuals

PDF Compressor Free Version appeared before the Committee during the public hearings and submitted as follows:

- (i) **Phillip Barnon from Eldoret** supported the Bill. He argued that the Bill will help to implement the two third gender rule and resolve issues of unfair nominations because all the seats would be subject to election and not nomination.
- (ii) **Jackline Sao from Turbo sub-county** supported the Bill. She felt it was a more transparent method of ensuring equal representation of both genders.
- (iii) **Mildred Keroka from Kakamega** supported the Bill for the reason that it will give women an opportunity to be elected and their interests to be effectively protected and provide women with opportunities to lead.
- (iv) **John Chepseba Ngetich from Kakamega** supported the Bill for the fact that the Bill provides for empowerment of women since they have been marginalized for a long period of time.
- (v) **Fred Otieno from Kisumu** supported the amendment. He thought that it will be a good idea and will help to eliminate the notion that women obtain political seats on a silver platter. It will further enable the electorate elect persons who will represent as opposed to the current provision that is gender based through nomination by parties at the county level. He also submitted that Parliament ought to look for a formula to enforce the gender rule without increasing the total composition of members of parliament as it is already bloated because of over representation. He proposed a rotational system for identification of certain constituencies for women to vie as representatives.
- (vi) **Ms. Fatuma Yusuf from Wajir** supported the amendments but proposed that political representation for persons with disabilities should not be progressive.
- (vii) **Mr. Shugri Abdi Omar from Wajir** supported the amendments on the grounds that one woman representative was not enough.
- (viii) **Bakari, Mwembe Tayari from Mombasa** supported designation of two constituencies as a single electoral unit for election of a woman representative and proposed that the population factor should be taken into account in designating electoral units.
- (ix) **Maurice Otieno** supported the amendments. He also supported the amendments to the two third gender rule. He proposed that each county should not have more than six representatives, three from each gender, two senators, one from each gender like the South African representative composition.

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- (x) **Asha Mwajuma from Mombasa** supported the amendments and proposed review of the number of wards prior to amending the constitution.
- (xi) **Pamela Makolha Lurambi sub-county** supported the Bill. That the Bill will give women an opportunity to be elected and their interests to be effectively represented.
- (xii) **Rose Agere from Lurambi sub-county** supported the Bill. That women ought to be supported in order to vie for elective positions as they have been marginalized for a long period of time.
- (xiii) **Steve Ochieng** supported the Bill. He proposed amendments to ward representative positions and felt that it will enable women to be effectively represented in counties. He further supported the nomination of persons with disability but opposed amendments related to the composition of parliament to effect the gender rule. He argued that an increase in the number of members will lead to a higher wage bill
- (xiv) **Jenipher Mary from Kisumu County** supported the Bill stating that it provides for conduct of elections based on ideology as opposed to the current status where women are nominated based on political patronage and favoritism.

CHAPTER 4

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4.0 CONSIDERATION OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS BY THE COMMITTEE

4.1 Proposed amendments to Article 89 of the Constitution

36. Article 89 of the Constitution is amended—

- (a) "by inserting the following new clause immediately after clause (1) as follows —
- "(1A) There shall be one thousand four hundred and fifty wards for the purposes of the election of the members of county assemblies provided for in Article 177 (1) (a)."
- (b) by deleting clause 3 and substituting therefor the following new clause (3)—
- a. The Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall —
- (a) at least twelve months before a general election of members of Parliament designate—
- (i) two adjacent constituencies in each county to be used as electoral units for the purposes of the election of members of Parliament specified in Article 97(1) (b) on the basis of geographical proximity;
 - (ii) three constituencies with the least number of voters in each county with an odd number of constituencies for the purposes of election of Members of Parliament specified in Article 97 (1) (b); and
 - (iii) two adjacent wards within each county to be used as electoral units for the purposes of the election of members of county assemblies specified in Article 177 (1) (b) on the basis of geographical proximity. Short title: Amendment of Article 89 of the Constitution of Kenya.
- (b) Review the names and boundaries of constituencies and wards at intervals of not less than eight years, but not more than twelve years, and any review shall be completed at least twelve months before a general election of members of Parliament and county assemblies.
- (c) in clause (5) by inserting the words "or ward" immediately after the words "each constituency"

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Proposed amendments to Article 90 of the Constitution

37. Article 90 of the Constitution is amended in clause (1) by deleting the expression

"(b), (c) and (d) and for the members of the county assemblies under Article 177 (1) (b)" appearing immediately after the expression "98 (1)" and substituting therefor the expression "(c) and the members of the county assemblies under Article 177 (1) (b)".

Proposed amendments to Article 97 of the Constitution

38. Article 97 of the Constitution is amended-

(a) in clause (1) by—

(i) deleting sub clause (b) and substituting therefor the following new sub clause—

"(b) subject to clause (3), one hundred and thirty-six women each elected by the registered voters of two adjacent constituencies in each county, the two adjacent constituencies constituting a single member constituency.

(ii) deleting sub clause (c) and substituting therefor the following new sub clause —

"(c) twenty-two persons with disability nominated by parliamentary political parties according to their proportion of members of the National Assembly in accordance with Article 90;

(b) by inserting the following new clauses immediately after clause (2) for purposes of clause (1) (b), the three constituencies with the least number of registered voters shall constitute a single member constituency in counties with an odd number of constituencies.

(4) The nominations under clause (1) (c) shall—

(i) ensure the membership of the National Assembly is constituted in accordance with Article 27 (8);

(ii) subject to clause (3)(a), be representative of other special interests, including the youth and workers.

(5) The provisions of clause 1 (b) shall lapse on the expiry of a period of ten years from the date of the first general elections after the commencement of this Act subject to clause (6).

(6) Parliament may enact legislation to extend the period under clause (5) for one further fixed period not exceeding ten years"

(7) A Bill to enact the provisions of clause (6) shall be passed by a vote supported by not less than two-thirds of all members of the National Assembly and not less than two-thirds of all the county delegations in the Senate."

Proposed amendments to Article 98 of the Constitution

39. Article 98 of the Constitution is amended in clause (1) —

"(i) by deleting subclause (a) and substituting therefor the following new subclause—

"(a) ninety-four members elected by the voters in the counties, each county constituting a constituency for the election of one man and one woman;

- (i) by deleting subclause (b);
- (ii) by deleting subclause (c) and substituting therefor the following new subclause (c)—

- (i) four members representing persons with disabilities; and
- (ii) two members representing the youth and elderly members of the society;
- (iv) by deleting subclause (d)

Proposed amendments to Article 177 of the Constitution

40. Article 177 of the Constitution is amended—

“(a) in clause (1) by deleting subclause (b) and substituting therefor the following new subclause—

“(b) seven hundred and twenty- five women elected by the registered voters of at least two adjacent wards in each county, the adjacent wards constituting a single member ward”

(b) in clause (2) by deleting the expression “(b) and” appearing immediately after the expression “clause (1)”;

(c) by deleting clause (3) and substituting therefor the following new clause (3) —

“(3) For the purposes of clause (1) (b), the adjacent wards shall fall within the county boundaries.

(d) by inserting the following new clauses immediately after clause 3—

“(3A) The nominations under clause (1) (c) shall ensure the membership of the National Assembly is constituted in accordance with Article 27 (8).

(3B) The provisions of clause 1 (b) shall lapse on the expiry of a period of ten years from the date of the first general elections after the commencement of this Act subject to clause (3C).

(3C) Parliament may enact legislation to extend the period under clause (3B) for one further fixed period not exceeding ten years.

(3D) A Bill to enact the provisions of clause (3C) shall be passed by a vote supported by not less than two-thirds of all members of the National Assembly and not less than two-thirds of all the county delegations in the Senate.”

41. Clause 7 of the Bill provides for the transition into the proposed membership of Parliament and County Assemblies by saving the unexpired term of Parliament and County Assemblies from application of the proposed amendments”

4.3 United Disabled Persons of Kenya

42. In Clause 4 of the Bill, the following new clause should be inserted in Article 97 of the Constitution:

“Prior to preparing its list of persons with disabilities for nomination to the National Assembly, each political party shall consult nationally representative organizations of persons with disabilities to determine candidates suitable for

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nomination, subject to regulations which the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall prepare."

43. In Clause 5 of the Bill, the following new clause should be inserted in Article 98 of the Constitution:

"Prior to preparing its list of persons with disabilities for nomination to the Senate, each political party shall consult nationally representative organizations of persons with disabilities to determine candidates suitable for nomination, subject to regulations which the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall prepare."

43. In Clause 6 of the Bill, the following new clause should be inserted in Article 177 of the Constitution:

'Prior to preparing its list of persons with disabilities for nomination to a County Assembly, each political party shall consult organizations of persons with disabilities representative in the particular county to determine candidates suitable for nomination, subject to regulations which the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall prepare.'

4.4 Committee observations

44. Members of the committee observed that the proposed amendment Bill has proposals that can address the question of gender representation in Parliament.

45. Sixty percent of the participants across the counties supported the proposed amendments and forty percent of the were against the proposed amendments.


Committee recommendation

The Committee considered its draft report on the Constitution of Kenya (Amendment), 2019 (National Assembly Bill No. 53) by Hon. Boss Shollei and observed as follows;

1. The principal object of the Bill is to amend the Constitution in order to ensure that the numbers of Members of Parliament reflect the requirement of Article 27 (8) that not more than two-thirds of the members of elective or appointive bodies shall be of the same gender. The Bill further seeks to ensure that the membership of Parliament also reflects the requirement of Article 54 (2) of the Constitution that at least five percent of the members of the public in elective and appointive bodies be persons with disabilities.
2. With regard to the Membership of the County Assemblies, the Bill seeks to limit the number of representative wards to one thousands four hundred and fifty and provide for the election of one woman for at least every two wards in a County for purposes of gender parity and to remove the provision for post-election gender top-up seats.
3. The Constitution sets out equality and freedom from discrimination as fundamental rights and freedoms. The proposed amendment seeks to entrench gender equality and the inclusion of historically marginalized persons in the representation of the people by reserving a minimum number of seats in Parliament for women and persons with disability.
4. 60% of the views of the Kenyans collected during the public hearings conducted by the Committee in various Counties supported to the amendments while 40% were opposed to the amendments.

The Committee unanimously adopted its report on the Constitution of Kenya (Amendment), 2019 (National Assembly Bill No. 53) by Hon. Boss Shollei and recommended that the Bill be passed as 60% of the Kenyans overwhelming supported the amendments. The adoption was proposed by Hon. Zuleikha Hassan and seconded by Hon. George Murugara

INSIDE THE KQ FLIGHT CANCELLATIONS SINKHOLE

Inside the KQ flight cancellations sinkhole

The airline has already cancelled 53 flights in 18 days of August alone

Kenya Airways has cancelled more than 52 flights in the first 15 days of August and delayed 60 per cent of the successful flights this year at an astronomical cost of \$60 million.

According to a confidential source, which speaks a witness into what sets the loss-making airline, frequent cancellations and delays have led to a loss of \$60 million in the last 15 days of August.

The financial crisis, known by its international code, KQ, predicts Kenya Airways will lose for the year ending December, and at higher rates than a typical airline.

The company's rising revenue is \$1.8 billion, but it is being driven by passenger bookings.

In the last two months, the airline has faced a barrage of complaints from customers over frequent cancellations and delays of flights. This has seen the government even issuing an ultimatum to the airline to improve its operations from the ground.

Sources say the biggest of the cancellations that have hit the airline is the cancellation of flights to the United States, which has led to a loss of \$10 million.

A confidential internal analysis of the airline's July performance shows that the cost of cancelled flights was \$60 million, a figure that was exceeded by the cost of the airline's operations.

Under the Finance and Treasury Agreement (2018) in place, Kenya Airways is not allowed to spend more than \$1 billion without getting any ministerial approval, a source says it is now being reviewed, leading to the increasing cost of the cancellations.

"During flight delays or cancellations, Kenya Airways is expected to provide essential services such as accommodation, meals and transportation as the situation requires, with an increasing number of..."

Out of the 53 cancelled flights, 31,000 successful departures this year, only 24,436 (for 60%) were on time, 7,564 were delayed by more than an hour and 100 flights cancelled.

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Governors to appeal ruling on office exit

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CoG chair Oparanya says ineffective barring charged county chiefs from office is causing confusion

The Council of Governors (CoG) on Friday will appeal Justice Mutahi Nguni's ruling that governors are charged with economic crime in some offices during the duration of their term.

They said the ruling violated the rights of innocent persons and has triggered panic and confusion in counties.

Addressing a press conference yesterday at the Council headquarters in Delta House, Nairobi, CoG chair Wycliffe Oparanya said the ruling challenges the rule of natural justice that accused persons are innocent until proven guilty. "Introducing a general and blanket ban on removal of innocent persons is charged to public,"

Oparanya said in a letter to the Attorney General, Mr. Amos Wambua, and the Attorney General's Office, Mr. James Njuguna, on August 17.

On July 24, Justice Nguni said county governors, just like other civil servants, should not stay in office until their case is cleared or determined. Justice Nguni's decision was made by the Anti-Corruption and Economic Crimes Act, which bars officials from holding office until their case is cleared.

strayed public

The judge held that a governor cannot remain in office to serve his constituency as he had betrayed the public trust.

Oparanya said Justice Nguni's ruling has caused the affected county governments confusion and anguish as deputy governors are supposed to fill the vacant offices.

Case in point is Kiambu Deputy Governor Isaac Nyoro who quit some operations of the county in an acting capacity in accordance with Article 177 (9) of the Constitution, which states that when the county governor is absent, the deputy county governor shall act as the county governor.

"Who can see what is happening is alarmed. Now the Deputy Governor is supposed to have an oath and work to seek and transfer with the law. County Government Act is clear what a deputy governor can do and what he

cannot do," he said.

Further, he argued that the ruling asking accused persons are treated as innocent until proven guilty then they continue to serve to cause the trapping of them with power.

However, governors and other state officers were being hit by Section 62 Subsection 6 of the same Act that provides: "This section does not apply with respect to an officer. If the Constitution limits or provides for the grounds upon which a holder of the office may be removed or the circumstances in which the office may be vacated."

Meanwhile, it will not be walking the path for the governor's liability in removing the ruling place, since the appeals by Local and Western have been dropped.

Before Justice Nguni's ruling, county governors would plead not guilty to a case, as it was in the CoG's case against Oparanya, who secured release by paying cash bail and return to his constituency. But any other public officer including cabinet ministers, would be suspended as soon as they were charged based on Section 62 of the Anti-Corruption and Economic Crimes Act of 2010.

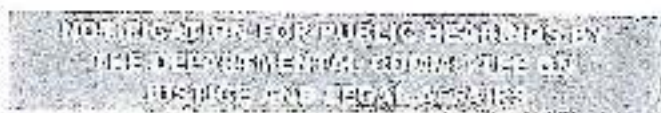

Kenya has a population of 35,000 elephants



Japan and the EU were criticised on Wednesday for failing to close their ivory markets as a commitment of the 2015 High Level wildlife summit.

The two countries have not honoured the commitment made by parties during the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora, Conference. In international, South African elephants are declining significantly throughout Africa and Asia. Kenya has 35,000 elephants. Tourism CEO Joseph Rotich and acting Director Biodiversity, Research and Planning at KWS are in the Kenya delegation at Kenya's CITES conference in Geneva, Switzerland. Kenya's position is that all legal ivory markets, whether in Asia or Europe or elsewhere else in the world, such illegal trade, poaching and killing of elephants.

also the trade closed. The parties to CITES took issue with countries that still host domestic ivory markets, urging them to shut them. Further, they insisted that comprehensive measures be undertaken with stockpiles need to be strengthened.

On April 20, 2016, Kenya set a limit 100 tonnes of elephant ivory with 135 tonnes of China taken to market each. Poached ivory Kenya had world leading export quantities in terms of the number of some 6,000 elephants and 450 rhinos killed for their tusks.

"Kenya is a wildlife nation and we are committed," Rotich said.

The issue was meant to send a message to the world that ivory has no value and that its trade should be banned. Every year, at least 20,000 African elephants are killed illegally for their ivory.

Earlier in CITES talks in Kenya but only the country will help save the ivory animal from continuing habitat in many parts of the range within the country, some countries however, still prefer keeping their stockpiles.

 - (d) He supported the proposed amendment which seeks to specify the number of votes per candidate; and
 - (e) He proposed a change in the electoral system with a view to ensuring that the proposed amendments are aligned to the parliamentary system which promotes and advocates for competition.
3. Francis Ngunja (Former Majority Leader, Machakos County) supported the Bill and stated that the Bill would promote fair competition, he however cautioned that—
 - (a) the Bill was more mathematical than practical. In that, the women elected by the two constituencies consolidated as a single voter block may regard herself as a super MP;
 - (b) the amendments are likely to occasion duplicity of roles between the women elected by the amalgamated constituencies and the area M.P's;
 - (c) where figures do not tally as intended under the proposed amendment there shall most likely be a need to devise a mechanism of rebalancing the numbers.

COMMENTS AGAINST AMENDMENTS

1. The Bill is likely to multiply the predicaments we are attempting to cure since, as currently structured, there is a real likely hood that women representatives could exceed male representatives.
2. The proposed amendments are based on the premise that no women shall be elected outside the proposed number of 136 women. However, there is real likely hood that more women could be elected under other elective position. This could tilt the two-thirds gender rule significantly in favor of women.
3. Pauline Kisitu, Mavoko Sub-county supported the Bill but cautioned against further increment of the already bloated wage Bill. In her view, the proposed amendments were unnecessary.
4. Solomon Mburvi, the amendments are likely to set up Governors against the Senators. We have already witnessed fighting between the current county senators and their governors. Having two senators within one county will only create more fighting and disharmony between the governor and the two senators or infighting between the senators themselves. The amendments are also likely to stifle development in the counties.
5. James Makau, the current number of constituencies is sufficient. The traditional mindset which harboured discrimination against women has since evolved.
6. Danson Kilenzo, retired teacher, was against the Bill for the following reasons—
 - (a) The political system in Kenya is tailored to suit politicians and provide opportunities only for them; and
 - (b) The attempt to accord women preferential treatment is discriminatory against men.
7. Duncan Musyoka, supported the Bill but proposed amendments to have the clause on nomination of women deleted and substituted with nomination of persons with

an equal platform. According preferential treatment to women is retrogressive. They ought to compete on an equal platform with men. The society continues to empower women in different ways.

5. Ndonga Ndonge supported the Bill. He argued that politics is about competition. He however advised on the need for caution in legislating on the proposed amendments to avoid duplication of roles as cited under para. 3.

6. James Makau Kithika, he supported the Bill but called for caution to ensure that the wage Bill is not expanded unnecessarily.

7. Beatrice Nzau, Machakos County, she supported the Bill by stating that it was offering a mentorship platform for women. She proposed that the sunset clause will allow women enough time to equip themselves with the necessary skills and tools to compete with men.

8. Stephen Mwanza supported the Bill but cautioned that clauses whose effect is to increase the wage Bill should not be entertained. He also cautioned that the Bill was likely to have the effect of creating super MP's and this should be discouraged.

disability. The requirement on compliance with the 2/3 gender rule should be done away with since the wage-bill is too high.

9. James Oridasa, County Government of Machakos, did not support the Bill for the reason that the wage Bill is too high.

10. Salim Abdi, Machakos County, the two thirds gender rule is unsustainable. He observed that the most viable alternative is to amend the Constitution and expunge the two-thirds gender rule.

3. Asha Wema, supported the Bill. She argued that just like men, women can make good leaders but society has not offered them a platform to lead. She also supported provision of a specified number of wards (fixed number of constituencies).
4. Joseph Owers, supported the Bill whilst proposing that nominated MCA positions should also be scrapped. All MCA positions should be elective.
5. Charles Orieno, supported the Bill but proposed scrapping of nominative seat for MCA.
6. Asha Mwajjama, supported the Bill and proposed review of the number of wards prior to amending the constitution. She supported designation of two or more constituencies to form a single electoral unit for purposes of electing a women representation.

1. Godfrey Mayo, society is not ready for women leadership. We promulgated an overly ambitious constitution, thus some of the challenges that have been witnessed in its implementation.

COMMENTS IN SUPPORT OF AMENDMENTS

1. Ms Tabitha Nawai, a member of the Maendeleo ya Wanawake Organization, supported the proposed amendments. Ms Nawai was of the view that women were generally hard workers and Parliament and the people of Kenya were better off with more women in Parliament as proposed in the Bill;
2. Ms Elizabeth Nyanga, Chairlady and village elder, supported the Bill and was of the view that it was long overdue since women had been left behind in leadership. Ms Nyanga was further of the view that the alleged additional costs could be reviewed in the "Punguzo Mizigo" constitutional amendment;
3. Ms Jennifer Liko, member of the Maendeleo ya Wanawake Organization, also supported the Bill. She was of the view that women are better leaders and their numbers in Parliament should be increased;
4. Mr. Mackenzie Hidakon, Chief, Kalokol, supported the Bill and was of the view that women had complained for too long about being underrepresented in Parliament and it is time the law was amended to take on board their concerns;
5. Mr. Mackenzie Hantikor, Chief, Kalokol, supported the Bill but was also of the further view that women then should not be allowed to stand for elections in the seats not reserved for them;

COMMENTS AGAINST AMENDMENTS

1. Mr. Josephat Ekaale Epiyo, village elder, opposed the proposed amendments and was of the view that granting women at least one third of the membership of Parliament will increase the number of women in Parliament to very high levels. Mr Epiyo further stated that increased numbers of women MPs will lead to family break ups and higher divorce levels in society;
2. Mr. Samuel Lokool, Assistant Chief, opposed the amendments on the ground that the proposed increased numbers of women in Parliament did not leave room for uneducated women to take up those seats and represent their people;
3. Mr. Daniel Namojong, Chief, opposed the amendments and was of the view that it was wrong and against the principles of democracy to amend the law and force people to elect women as MPs in certain circumstances;
4. Mr. Joseph Lokwan, village elder, opposed the Bill and was of the view that the Bill was a precursor to men being made a minority in Parliament since there was no provision reserving even a single seat for men in Parliament. Lokwan was further opposed to the merger of constituencies whose boundaries are normally arrived at after difficult negotiations;

MEMORANDUM ON THE CONSTITUTION OF KENYA (AMENDMENT) BILL, 2019

1. This Memorandum has been prepared by the Caucus on Disability Rights Advocacy (CDRA) which is a coalition of stakeholders in disability advocacy and the United Disabled Persons of Kenya (UDPK) which is the national umbrella for organizations of persons with disabilities in response to the call for public consultation by the National Assembly.
2. CDRA and UDPK welcomes the proposals in the Constitution of Kenya (Amendment) Bill, 2019 (Bill), seeking to ensure that the membership of Parliament reflects Article 54 (2) of the Constitution which requires that at least five per cent of the members of elective or appointive bodies should be persons with disabilities.
3. CDRA and UDPK welcomes Clause 4 of the Bill which proposes to replace Article 97 (1) (c) of the Constitution, to specify that the membership of the National Assembly shall include twenty-two persons with disabilities nominated by parliamentary political parties according to their proportion of members of the National Assembly in accordance with Article 90. We also agree, as proposed in the Bill, that the slate of nominees with disabilities shall take account of the two-thirds gender rule established in Article 27 (8) of the Constitution.
4. CDRA and UDPK also Welcomes the provision in Clause 5 of the Bill which specifies that the Senate shall include four senators with disabilities nominated by political parties according to their proportion of members of the Senate elected under clause (1) (a) in accordance with Article 90 of the Constitution.
5. We also note that Clause 6 of the Bill does not make any material changes on the election of persons with disabilities to County Assemblies in terms of Article 177 of the Constitution.
6. Regarding the foregoing, CDRA and UDPK wishes to stress the imperative of ensuring that persons with disabilities participate in identifying persons who political parties would subsequently nominate to the National Assembly, Senate and County Assemblies in terms of the Constitution and the Bill.
7. The principle of public participation is a cardinal tenet of democracy and it is indeed one of the values established in Article 10 of the Constitution.

8. **PDF Compressor Free Version** Article 27 of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) requires Kenya to ensure that persons with disabilities have the right and opportunity to vote and be elected in political and public institutions. Furthermore, Article 4, 3 of the CRPD requires Kenya to closely consult with and actively involve persons with disabilities, through their representative organizations, in the development and implementation of legislation and policies and in other decision-making processes concerning issues relating to persons with disabilities.
9. CDRA and UDPK recognises that legislators with disabilities must be accountable to their nominating political parties. Yet, the representational responsibilities of such legislators must also be anchored on being accountable to the constituency of persons with disabilities.
10. Towards the above ends, CDRA and UDPK proposes the insertion of three provisions in Articles 97, 98 and 177 of the Constitution, to apply to legislators with disabilities nominated, respectively, to the National Assembly, the Senate and County Assemblies.
11. In Clause 4 of the Bill, the following new clause should be inserted in Article 97 of the Constitution:

'Prior to preparing its list of persons with disabilities for nomination to the National Assembly, each political party shall consult nationally representative organisations of persons with disabilities to determine candidates suitable for nomination, subject to regulations which the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall prepare.'

12. In Clause 5 of the Bill, the following new clause should be inserted in Article 98 of the Constitution:

'Prior to preparing its list of persons with disabilities for nomination to the Senate, each political party shall consult nationally representative organisations of persons with disabilities to determine candidates suitable for nomination, subject to regulations which the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall prepare.'

13. In Clause 6 of the Bill, the following new clause should be inserted in Article 177 of the Constitution:

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'Prior to preparing its list of persons with disabilities for nomination to a County Assembly, each political party shall consult organisations of persons with disabilities representative in the particular county to determine candidates suitable for nomination, subject to regulations which the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission shall prepare.'
