## 1.2 Committee Mandate

The Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs derives its mandate from provisions of standing order 216 (5) which outline functions of the Committee as being:

- a) To investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned ministries and departments;
- b) To study the Programme and policy objectives of ministries and departments and the effectiveness of their implementation;
- c) To study and review all the legislation referred to it;
- d) To study, assess and analyze the relative success of the ministries and departments measured by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives;
- e) To investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned ministries and departments as may be deemed necessary, and as may be referred to it by the House or a Cabinet Secretary;
- f) To vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order No.204 (Committee on appointments); and
- g) To make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendations of proposed legislation.

In accordance with Second Schedule of the Standing Orders, the Committee is mandated to consider:-

- a) Constitutional Affairs
- b) The administration of Law and Justice
- c) The Judiciary
- d) Public prosecutions
- e) Elections
- f) Ethics, Integrity and anti-corruption and
- g) Human rights

### 1.3 Nomination of the Solicitor General

Pursuant to Section 9(1) of the Office of the Attorney General Act, H.E the President, forwarded to the Speaker of the National Assembly, the name of Mr. Njee Muturi vide letter dated 18<sup>th</sup> June, 2013 to consider for approval by the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs.

On Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> June, 2013, the Honourable Speaker in a Communication to the House, informed the House that his office had received the name of Mr. Njee Muturi and directed that the name and Curriculum vitae of the said nominee be referred to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for approval hearings and reporting to the House on or before Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> June, 2013

### 1.4 Committee Meetings

The Committee held two sittings during which the said nominee appeared before the Departmental Committee on Justice and legal Affairs on Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> June, 2013 starting at 11.00 a.m and the approval hearing was conducted in accordance with the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No.33 of 2011 for appointment as Solicitor General.

## 2.0 BACKGROUND

### 2.1 ESTABLISHMENT OF THE DEPARTMENTAL COMMITTEE ON JUSTICE AND LEGAL AFFAIRS

The Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs is one of the Departmental Committees established under Standing Order No.216 (1) with the Mandate to consider for approval by the House, appointments of the Solicitor General under Section 9(1) of the Office of the Attorney General Act which requires H.E the President with the approval of the National Assembly, appoint the Solicitor General. Section 7(10) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act 2011, provides that;

“Where the nomination of a candidate is rejected by Parliament, the appointing authority may submit to the relevant House the name of another candidate, and the procedure for approval specified in this Act shall apply accordingly’.

The position of the Solicitor-General is established under Section 9 of the Office of the Attorney General Act No.49 of 2012.The Section provides that;

- 1) There shall be a Solicitor-General who shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the National Assembly (No. 33 of 2011).
- 2) The President shall nominate a person for appointment as a Solicitor-General from among persons recommended by the Public Service Commission.
- 3) A person shall be qualified for appointment to the office of Solicitor-General if the person-
  - (a) Is qualified to hold the office of judge of a superior court under the Constitution; and
  - (b) Meets the requirements of Chapter Six of the Constitution.
- 4) The Solicitor-General shall assist the Attorney-General in the performance of the duties of the Attorney-General.
- 5) The Solicitor- General shall carry out any function, discharge any duty and exercise any power as may be directed by the Attorney- General and shall-

- (a) Organise, co-ordinate and manage the administrative and the legal functions of the Office;
  - (b) Assist the Attorney-General in the performance of his duties as the principal legal advisor to the Government;
  - (c) Conduct, or assign and supervise all court cases, including appeals or petitions on behalf of the Attorney-General; and
  - (d) Subject to Article 234 of the Constitution, be responsible for the discipline of State Counsel and other members of staff of the Office.
- 6) In the performance of the functions and the exercise of the powers of the Solicitor - General, the Solicitor-General shall be responsible for—
- (a) Organizing and coordinating the administrative and legal functions of the Office;
  - (b) Formulating and ensuring implementation of development strategies for Government Legal Services;
  - (c) Undertaking duties of alternate chairperson of th the Disciplinary Tribunal;
  - (d) Performing duties of alternate Chairperson of the College of Arms;
  - (e) Performing duties as a member of the Council of Legal Education;
  - (f) Coordinating the attachment of candidates for pupillage in the Office; and
  - (g) Performing such other duties as may be conferred by law or otherwise assigned to the Solicitor-General by the Attorney-General.

## 2.2 APPOINTMENT PROCESS OF THE SOLICITOR GENERAL NOMINEE

- a. The Office of the Attorney-General Act No.49 of 2012 under section 9(2) Provides that the President shall nominate a person for appointment as Solicitor General from among persons recommended by the Public Service Commission.
- b. Pursuant to the said provision, the Public Service Commission invited applications from Kenyans wishing to be considered for the position of Solicitor

General through advertising in the print media and its website on 27<sup>th</sup> May, 2013.

c. The Public Service Commission received sixteen (16) applications and shortlisted ten (10) candidates for interviews.

d. The shortlisted candidates appeared for interviews before a panel constituted by the Commission on 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> June 2013.

e. Based on performance at the interviews, the Commission recommended three persons for consideration for appointment to the position of Solicitor General in the Office of the Attorney General and Department of Justice.

f. The persons whose names and curricula vitae were forwarded to H.E the President for consideration are;

- i )Muturi Njee
- ii) Muthoni Kimani
- iii) Tuimising' Nathan Ronoh

g. A letter from H.E the President to the Speaker of the National Assembly indicated that H.E the President had, nominated Mr.Njee Muturi to be considered for appointment as the Solicitor General.

h. On June 18<sup>th</sup>, 2013, the Honourable Speaker in a communication to the House referred the name of the nominee to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for approval hearings and directed the Committee to table its report to the House for consideration on or before Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> June, 2013.

i. The Public was expected to participate in the vetting process through submission of memoranda (affidavit) on the suitability or otherwise of the nominee. On Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> June,2013, the Clerk of the National Assembly placed an advertisement in the print media inviting the public to submit memoranda by Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> June, 2013 on the suitability or otherwise of the said nominee pursuant to section 6(9) of the public Appointments (parliamentary Approval ) Act 2011.

j.The Committee perused the report from the Chairperson of the Public Service Commission, information from Ethics and Anti-corruption Commission, Higher

Education Loans Board (HELB), Criminal Investigation Department (CID) and the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA).

### **3.0 APPROVAL OF THE SOLICITOR GENERAL NOMINEE**

In conducting the approval process, the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs examined the nominee against the following criteria, amongst others, in accordance with the Public Appointments (Parliament Approval) Act No.33 of 2011.

- (i) Academic qualifications
- (ii) Employment record
- (iii) Professional affiliations
- (iv) Potential conflict of interest
- (v) Knowledge of the relevant subject
- (vi) Overall suitability for the position
- (vii) Tax compliance
- (viii) Integrity and morality
- (ix) Vision, leadership and judicial reforms
- (x) Access to justice
- (xi) Expectations and key priorities

During its sitting held on Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> June, 2013, the committee orally conducted approval hearings of the nominee for appointment as Solicitor General.

### **3.1 APPEARANCE BEFORE THE COMMITTEE BY THE NOMINEE**

The nominee to the position of Solicitor General Mr. Njee Muturi appeared before the Justice and Legal Affairs Committee on Thursday June 27<sup>th</sup>, 2013 and was informed by the Chairperson that despite inviting Memoranda from the Public on his suitability or otherwise for appointment to position of Solicitor General, none had been received at the date of the approval hearings. The nominee responded to questions put to him by members of the Committee as follows;

On self introduction, knowledge, experience, qualification and context within the Attorney General's Office;

He informed the Committee that the position of the Solicitor General is a critical office in the legal profession and will act independently to discharge his duties as on admission to the Roll of Advocates, he swore to uphold the rule of law and if appointed, he will again take an oath of office to spearhead the rule of law. He further informed the Committee that:-

- He is committed to serve in the Public Service as shown by his record.
- His presence in Parliament on numerous occasions including during committee elections does not in any way mean that he influenced the election of Committee chairs but rather a coincidence having been associated with the institution. He is social by nature and has no interest in Committees.
- The Attorney General's Office has a lot of cases with inadequate staff to support it. It is a worrying trend that needs urgent attention if appointed.
- He appreciates accomplishments by the Solicitor General's office under the former government and promises to take the office to another level.
- The A.G is the leader and face of the Office of Attorney General and Department of Justice and thus anticipates a good working relationship with the office holder.
- He does not have the advantage of an insider but have the stature of an outsider with a different perspective to the office.
- He is qualified for the job and his performance will be his best Judge.

#### On ethnicity in the Attorney General's office:

- He stated that he is not informed about the composition of the office but will interrogate the question if approved for appointment to take up the responsibilities of the office.

#### On vision, he stated as follows:

- He will bring the Attorney General's office to the centre of Government and hope the government will respect the Attorney General's opinion.
- He will develop mechanisms to get the best out of staff in terms of performance.

#### On Challenges, he informed the Committee as follows:

- He will inculcate a culture of the rule of law.
- He needs to address the perennial question of high turnover of state counsels.

#### On his working relationship with experienced members of the A.Gs staff;

- He will wield supervisory authority over his junior staff but that authority is not unfettered and will not apply it arbitrary in enforcement of discipline.
- The knowledge and experience of seasoned members of staff will be tapped to achieve success as far as functions and duties of the office are concerned.

On Publications and research, he stated that;

- Publications and research are not a guarantee for success and performance.

On concerns by members on his nomination:

He explained that the process of recruitment was conducted by the Public Service Commission as stipulated by the law. He further stated that he applied for the job and was interviewed like other applicants.

- In addition, his nomination was not stage managed to have him appointed Solicitor General.

On Mau Mau Reparations he informed the Committee as follows:

The Mau Mau reparations case was instituted individually by victims of the emergency period and the Government of Kenya did not play a role in the case. However, the Government can facilitate payments from the British Government to the victims who are parties to the case. There is need for the Government to have a policy on reparations.

#### 4.0 COMMITTEE'S OBSERVATIONS

1. The Committee having considered the curriculum vitae of Mr.Njee Muturi and having heard his submissions during the approval hearing, made the following observations on his nomination:-

- i). That Mr. Njee Muturi is a Kenyan citizen born on 20<sup>th</sup> March, 1967.
- ii). He holds a Bachelors of Arts degree in Economics and Political Science (B.A Econ.) from Poona University's Nowrosjee Wadia College in India and a Bachelors degree in Law (LLB) (Hon) Poona University's Symbiosis College in India. He attended the Kenya School of Law and was called to the Bar as an Advocate of the High Court of Kenya.
- iii). He is a member of the Law Society of Kenya and the East African Law Society.
- iv). He recently served as Deputy Director in charge of Co-ordination in the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister.

- v). He has previously served as an associate in the Law firm of Kigano & Associates Advocates where he handled criminal cases that exposed him to state law office, Partner in Muturi, Karanja and Gakuo Advocates which later changed to Muturi, Gakuo and Company Advocates which exists.
- vi). As a legal practitioner, he was involved in various aspects of practice including criminal and civil litigation, family law, commercial law, conveyance, Banking and Insurance, Judicial review, election petitions, constitutional references and winding up limited liability companies.
- vii). He has served as personal assistant to the leader of Official Opposition in the 9<sup>th</sup> Parliament where he was involved in assisting the leader respond to government motions, bills and preparing the same for the leader to move the house.
- viii). He acted as secretary to the Parliamentary group for five years, prepared briefs for the leader of opposition, analyzed bills and prepared the first Shadow Budget for the Opposition.
- ix). He participated in the National Constitutional Conference (2003-2005) as an observer
- x). The nominee was involved in the Constitutional review process as part of the technical support to the Cabinet Committee on Constitutional Review.
- xi). The nominee was part of the Parliamentary staff that prepared the Anglo-leasing report by virtue of being the personal assistant to the official opposition leader.
- xii). Participated in International Leader's Visitor Program of the United States of America by attending lectures at Boston University, Harvard University, Berkeley, Stanford and University of Central Florida. The program was on internal democracy in political parties and at the same time they witnessed American party primaries.
- xiii). He responded well to a question on Integrity and was open in declaring his wealth including deferred income.
- xiv). He demonstrated good understanding of the Law by emphasizing the rule of law as a fundamental asset in the legal profession.

- xv). The Committee was concerned that other applicants with superior qualifications may have been overlooked by the nominating authority.
- xvi). The nominee had no integrity issues with the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission which confirmed that he is not under any investigation.
- xvii). He was cleared by the Kenya Revenue Authority, Higher Education Loans Board, the Law Society of Kenya and the Criminal Investigations Department.
- xviii). The Committee noted that the upper echelons of the State Law Office seem not to reflect regional balance and it's hoped that the appointing authority will ensure this imbalance is addressed.
- xix). The Committee by majority found the nominee suitable and qualified for appointment as the Solicitor General.

#### 5.0 RECOMMENDATION OF THE COMMITTEE

THAT Pursuant to Section 9(1) of the Office of Attorney General Act No.49 of 2012 and Standing Orders 216 (5) (f) and 199, the Committee recommends that:-

This House approves Mr.Njee Muturi for appointment by H.E the President as Solicitor General.





The nominee was informed by the Chairperson that despite inviting Memoranda from the Public on his suitability or otherwise for appointment to position of Solicitor General, none had been received at the date of the approval hearings. The nominee responded to questions put to him by members of the Committee as follows

In conducting the approval hearings, Members examined the nominee against the following criteria, amongst others, in accordance with the Public Appointments (Parliament Approval) Act No.33 of 2011.

- Academic qualifications
- Employment record
- Professional affiliations
- Potential conflict of interest
- Knowledge of the relevant subject
- Overall suitability for the position
- Integrity and morality
- Vision, leadership
- Expectations and Challenges

### On self introduction, knowledge, experience, qualification and context within the Attorney General's Office

- He stated that he graduated with a degree in political Science and Economics and a Bachelor of Laws (LL.B), both from Poona University in India, Post-graduate diploma from Kenya School of law and is an Advocate of the High Court of Kenya.
- He informed the Committee that the position of the Solicitor General is a critical office in the legal profession and will act independently to discharge his duties as on admission to the Roll of Advocates, he swore to uphold the rule of law and if appointed, he will again take an oath of office to spearhead the rule of law.
- He is committed to serve in the Public Service as shown by his record.
- His presence in Parliament on numerous occasions including during committee elections does not in any way mean that he influenced the election of Committee chairs but rather a coincidence having been associated with the institution .He is social by nature and has no interest in Committees.
- The Attorney General's Office has a lot of cases with inadequate staff to support it. It is a worrying trend that needs urgent attention if appointed.
- Appreciates accomplishments by the Solicitor General's office under the former government and promises to take the office to another level.
- The A.G is the leader and face of the Office of Attorney General and Department of Justice and thus anticipates a good working relationship with the office holder.
- He does not have the advantage of an insider but have the stature of an outsider with a different perspective to the office and that he is qualified for the job where his performance will be his best Judge.

### On ethnicity in the Attorney General's office:

- He stated that he is not informed about the composition of the office but will interrogate the question if approved for appointment to take up the responsibilities of the office.

On vision, he stated as follows:

- He will bring the Attorney General's office to the centre of Government and hope the government will respect the Attorney's opinion.
- To develop mechanisms to get the best out of staff in terms of performance.

On Challenges, he informed the Committee as follows:

- He will inculcate a culture of the rule of law.
- He needs to address the perennial question of high turnover of state counsels.

On his working relationship with experienced members of the A.Gs staff;

- He will wield supervisory authority over his junior staff but that authority is not unfettered and will not apply it arbitrary in enforcement of discipline.
- The knowledge and experience of seasoned members of staff will be tapped to achieve success as functions and duties of the office are concerned.

On Publications and research, he stated that;

- Publications and research are not a guarantee for success and performance.

On concerns by members on his nomination:

He explained that the process of recruitment was conducted by the Public Service Commission as stipulated by the law. He further stated that he applied for the job and was interviewed like other applicants.

- In addition, his nomination was not stage managed to have him appointed Solicitor General.

On Mau Mau Reparations he informed the Committee as follows:

- The Mau Mau reparations case was instituted individually by victims of the emergency period and the Government of Kenya did not play a role in the case. However, the Government can facilitate payments from the British



Government to the victims who are parties to the case. There is need for the Government to have a policy on reparations.

**COMMITTEE'S OBSERVATIONS**

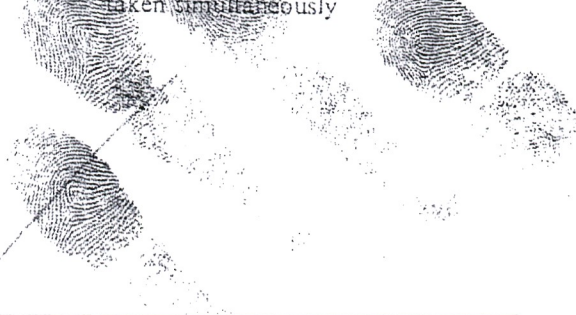
